## Dear colleague,

We are writing to request your support in creating an exciting new EGOS Standing Working Group (SWG) on Craft and Emerging Forms of Organizing starting in 2026. In the EGOS tradition, familiar to many of you, a SWG is an opportunity to build a scholarly community and host several sub-themes (during 4 years) around themes and research problems fitted under the 'umbrella' of the SWG. During a number of years, there has been a growing research interest in craft in a broad sense, and there are several communities formed, including those centred around previous EGOS sub-themes, presently running large studies and a Kyoto Workshop. Craft and Emerging Forms of Organizing is meant to include research on making, on ethics of care and what this means for the organization of work, for resource-use, and for a sustainable economy, but also questions of meaning, aesthetics and creativity more broadly (including questions of innovation, of entrepreneurial craft, and socioeconomic development). With this initiative we want to provide an opportunity for you to join forces with us and show your support for strengthening and enlarging this community. Our growing team of organizers consists of Daniel Hjorth, Marta Gasparin, Elena Raviola (convening a 2024 sub-theme on this topic), Emma Bell, Lena Olaison, Fabrizio Panozzo, Jean Clarke, Yutaka Yamauchi, Judith Nyfeler, Pursey Heugens, Davide Ravasi, Jo-Ellen Pozner, Jochem Kroezen, and Innan Sasaki. We are also applying for a Craft sub-theme in 2025. Diversity and inclusivity are central to our growing community and we thrive on heterogeneity that present us with more in-betweens from where new questions and problems emerge. In-between us there are several research problems explored, including craft and new technologies; craft and entrepreneurship; innovative craft; the materiality of making; craft and ethics of care; aesthetics and business creativity; crafting communities; craft and ecological economies; craft, design and identity; craft and inequality; craft, occupations and the future of work; and so on. We welcome more perspectives and approaches and hope to creatively organize this community of ours with your contributions.

We see craft research as an important field of knowledge-creation and application that is crucial in helping societies transition toward more sustainable futures, where organizations are part of society and the economy is part of the ecology such that we can learn to care for what we make, maintain and cultivate, with the goal of a more inclusive, sustainable and beautiful life. We see EGOS as a key strategic arena for progressing our research-based knowledge on this. For this, a diverse, multi-disciplinary conversation is needed, and a standing working group would secure this. This includes Special Issues and edited volumes where we can contribute to moving the field ahead. While our initiative is one – and we believe an important one – it of course does not seek monopoly on these questions. We welcome other initiatives in the broad EGOS palette, but would also be happy to see you submitting to our initiative should it be successful.
